



Macarena Gómez-Barris' is a writer and scholar. She is author of three books including, The Extractive Zone: Social Ecologies and Decolonial Perspectives (Duke University Press, 2017) that examines five scenes of ruinous extractive capitalism. Beyond the Pink Tide: Art and Political Undercurrents in the Américas (UC Press, 2018), a text of critical hope about the role of submerged art and activisms in troubled times. She is also author of Where Memory Dwells: Culture and State Violence in Chile (2009), and co-editor with Herman Gray of Towards a Sociology of a Trace (2010). She is working on a new book, At the Sea's Edge (Duke University Press). Macarena is the Founding Director of the Global South Center at Pratt Institute, www.globalsouthcenter.org.



CARA DAGGETT

Desiring Energy: Toxic Fantasies of Fuel, Freedom, and Work

Cara Daggett is an assistant professor of political science in the Department of Political Science at Virginia Tech. Her research explores the politics of energy and the environment in an era of planetary disruption. She is interested in questions that lie at the nexus of human wellbeing, science, technology, and the more-than-human world.

Daggett's book, *The Birth of Energy: Fossil Fuels*, *Thermodynamics*, and the Politics of Work (Duke, 2019), was awarded the Clay Morgan Award for best book in environmental political theory. *The Birth of Energy* traces the genealogy of energy back to the nineteenth-century science of thermodynamics to challenge the underlying logic that informs today's uses of energy. Daggett has also published several academic articles and book chapters, including in Environmental Politics, Energy Research & Social Science, Millennium: Journal of International Studies and in the International Feminist Journal of Politics, for which she won the journal's 2015 Enloe Award.



SARAH JAQUETTE RAY

Emotions in an Era of Climate Change

Sarah Jaquette Ray is professor and chair of environmental studies at Humboldt State University, on Wiyot territory in Arcata, California. Her work focuses on environmental justice, the environmental humanities, climate justice activism, and climate psychology.

She is author of two books, *The Ecological Other:* Environmental Exclusion in American Culture, and most recently, A Field Guide to Climate Change: How to Keep Your Cool on a Warming Planet, and has co-edited three collections in on the environmental humanities and justice. She publishes and speaks extensively on the topics of emotions, climate justice, and youth activism, and is currently working on two projects to help educators better support students' existential needs around planetary injustice, a co-edited book and website called An Existential Toolkit for Climate Justice Educators and a professional development workshop called the Climate Wisdom Lab.
